MSU Human Development Clinic (from: BoZone, November 15, 2012)

The Human Development Clinic at MSU (located at 1501 S 3rd Ave) provides quality low-cost mental health services to adults, adolescents and children of Gallatin Valley and surrounding areas. The clinic offers individual, couple and family therapy for a variety of counseling needs including stress reduction, relationship issues, sexuality, divorce, parenting, career decisions, grief and loss, anger, depression and anxiety.

The first appointment is free; thereafter costs range from \$5 - \$30 per session based on a sliding scale according to income. A Parenting Through Divorce workshop is also offered to the community for a nominal fee.

The clinic serves as a training facility for graduate students in the counseling program at Montana State University. All graduate student counselors are supervised by University faculty who are licensed mental health professionals.
